ANNUAL BUDGET 2024-2025

A Message from the Superintendent

At the April 9, 2024 Board of Education meeting, the board set the budget for the 2024-2025 school year at \$22,140,845 which is an increase of 6.32% in appropriations. This increase is based upon increases in contracts, fringe benefits, outright purchasing of diesel buses, and BOCES purchases, which drives more state aid. The increase along with the projected revenues for the District sets the tax levy increase at 2.00% which is below the allowable tax levy increase of 2.8% which is an equivalent of \$116,951. This tax increase is much lower than the inflation rate for the past year.

State Aid and Federal Funds

Beaver River has been allocated an increase of 4.11% in state foundation aid. This along with other sources of state aid is approximately two-thirds of the revenue the district receives. We are very dependent upon state aid to maintain our programming. For the 2024-25 school year the district is able to maintain many of its programs due to the increase in aid. This budget also includes our Capital Outlay project covering safety, security and efficiency needs. We budget annually \$100,000 which is aided at 82%.

As we focus on our strategic plan and academic support we continue to develop plans for meeting the needs of our students. This past year we have leveraged grants, and other funding to increase the support for our neediest students. For instance, we added a full day Pre-K program this past year by applying for our Pre-K grant. This was the first year of the program and is at full capacity. We continue to provide early learning support with our long standing half day program as well. In addition, through proactive budgeting we are able to provide academic support, adding an instructional coach that will provide training in the Science of Reading (SOR) and other research based instructional practices.

Tax Cap Calculation

The tax cap calculation is determined by multiple factors. Most people understand that the cap is typically 2.0%. This is generally true but in some cases a municipality such as a school district may find that the calculation is higher or lower due to various factors. Most often, for a school district, the change in the tax cap related to capital project expenditures, debt payments, and PILOT reimbursements. Our tax cap calculation for the 2024-2025 school year is 2.8%. The board has decided that keeping us at 2.00% for an increase made logical sense this year. This provides a break for our taxpayer but continues to provide support for increases related to inflation. As you can see from the chart on the following page, since 2012-2013 when the tax cap began, we have remained at 2.00% or lower. Each year the budget process is challenging. Our goal is to streamline our operations to efficiently provide quality academic programs. Through work with our financial consultant we have developed a five year plan to ensure that our reserves are set at a point to maintain our programming during times of state aid cuts so that the burden on taxpayers is lessened.



Propositions

- **Capital Reserve Fund** – A capital reserve fund is an account used to save for a capital project and thus limit the impact on taxpayers when a building project is proposed. The reserve is set at a maximum amount. While this proposition states that the fund is to be set at \$2,000,000, that is the most that can be funded. Over time we will add funds to this account to offset a tax increase due to a capital project.
- **Capital Improvement/Bus Reserve** – This is a new type of reserve that we are asking voters to approve. While the district is not planning on purchasing electric buses in the coming school year, and hopefully the mandate will be delayed, we need to plan for the current requirements. As it stands now, the district, or for that matter, all municipalities in NY must only purchase zero emission vehicles beginning in 2027. The cost of these vehicles is significantly higher and we will need to be sure we can maintain our fleet. This reserve provides an account to save for not only electric buses, the fund can be used for a bus of any type. If the mandate is delayed, we can still use this fund to purchase *diesel or gasoline* buses. Meanwhile we are pursuing other funding opportunities including grants to offset the increased cost of electric buses.
- **Increase Library Funding (Croghan Library)** – Our local libraries do not have a process for collecting funding on their own, so they use the school district tax collection process. Thus voters have an opportunity to vote on any increase to funding required for our local libraries to operate. This year the Croghan Library is asking for an increase. Please review the note from the Croghan Library later in this newsletter.

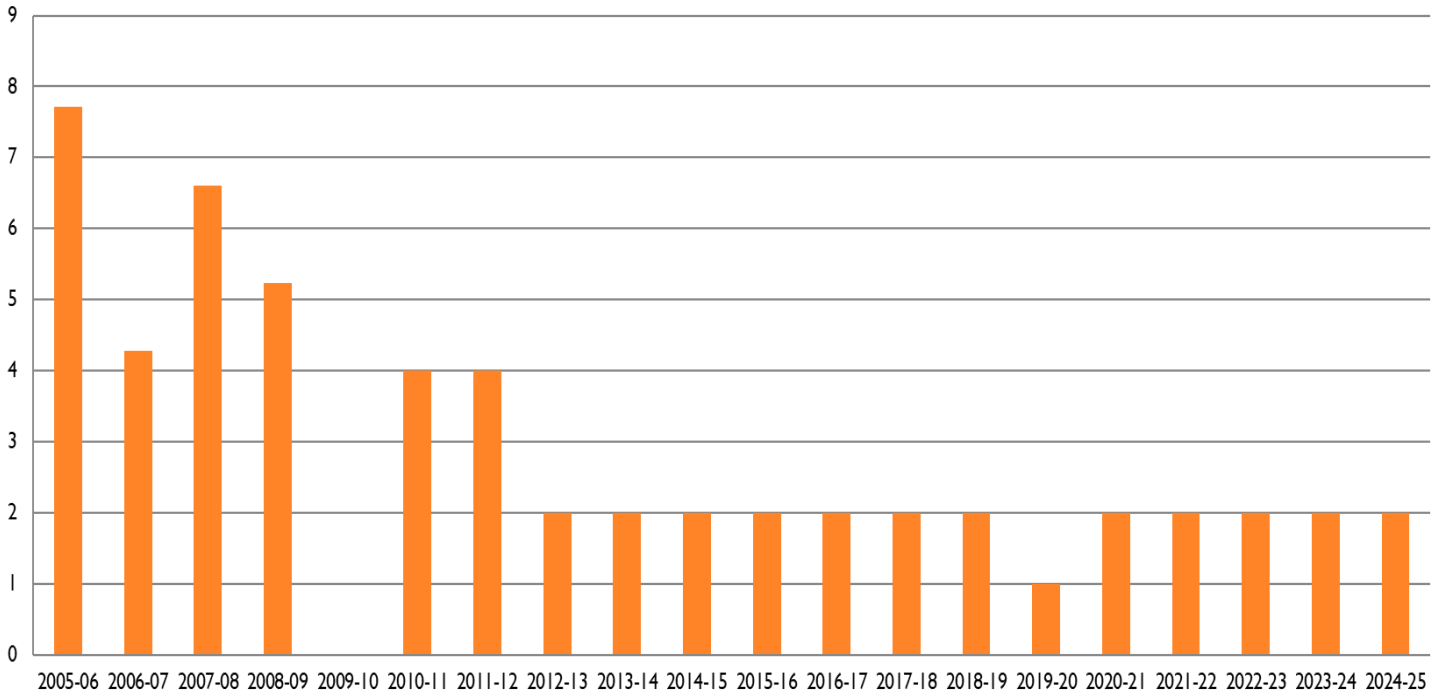

PROPOSITION 1: BUDGET RESOLUTION FOR THE 2024-2025 SCHOOL YEAR

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of Beaver River Central School District at Beaver Falls, County of Lewis, is hereby authorized to expend the sums set forth in the amount of \$22,140,895 for the 2024-2025 school year, is hereby approved and adopted, and the required funds therefore are hereby appropriated, and the necessary real property taxes required shall be raised by a tax on the taxable property in the District to be levied and collected as required by law?

PROPOSITION 2: ESTABLISHMENT OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS RESERVE FUND

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Beaver River Central School District (the "District") is hereby authorized to establish a capital reserve fund pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law of the State of New York (the "Fund"); that the Fund shall be known as the "Capital Improvements Reserve Fund" of the District; that the Fund shall be established for the purpose of financing, in whole or in part, the District's activities in acquiring, constructing, reconstructing, adding to, renovating, altering and improving District buildings, facilities, grounds and real property, including the acquisition of original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required in connection therewith; that the ultimate amount of such Fund shall be not greater than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) plus interest earned thereon; that the probable term of such Fund shall be no longer than ten (10) years but such Fund shall continue in existence for its stated purpose until liquidated in accordance with the Education Law; and that the permissible sources from which the Board is authorized to appropriate monies to such Fund from time to time shall be (a) current and future unappropriated fund balances from the General Fund of the District, (b) State aid received as reimbursement for expenditures by the District in connection with District capital improvements (whether or not financed in whole or in part from such Fund), (c) the proceeds from the sale of unneeded District real or personal property and (d) such other sources as the Board or the voters of the District may direct?

PROPOSITION 3: ESTABLISHMENT OF CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS/BUS RESERVE FUND

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education (the "Board") of the Beaver River Central School District (the "District") is hereby authorized to establish a capital reserve fund pursuant to Section 3651 of the Education Law of the State of New York (the "Fund"); that the Fund shall be known as the "Capital Improvements / Bus Reserve Fund" of the District; that the Fund shall be established for the purpose of financing, in whole or in part, the District's activities in acquiring school buses of any fuel type; that the ultimate amount of such Fund shall be not greater than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) plus interest earned thereon; that the probable term of such Fund shall be no longer than ten (10) years but such Fund shall continue in existence for its stated purpose until liquidated in accordance with the Education Law; and that the permissible sources from which the Board is authorized to appropriate monies to such Fund from time to time shall be (a) current and future unappropriated fund balances from the General Fund of the District, (b) State aid received as reimbursement for expenditures by the District in connection with District capital improvements (whether or not financed in whole or in part from such Fund), (c) the proceeds from the sale of unneeded District real or personal property and (d) such other sources as the Board or the voters of the District may direct?

PROPOSITION 4: INCREASE LOCAL LIBRARY FUNDING

RESOLVED, the appropriation for the Croghan Free Library within the Beaver River Central School District be increased to \$55,000 (which is a \$5,000 increase from the \$50,000 levy currently in existence), which shall be raised by a tax upon the taxable property of the School District in accordance with Education Law?

She has 3 children, Adah (6th grade), Avery (3rd grade) and Ashton who will start Pre-K this fall. Here at Beaver River, she is the President of the Beaver River Home & School Association, the BRCS Foundation where she holds the secretary position, the Beaver River Ag Advisory Board, the Beaver River Compact Council and also the Lewis County Holstein Club. She is running for a position on the school board with hopes to help keep Beaver River on the path of preparing our children for the world after graduation. She wants children to be prepared and thrive in whatever their future holds. She would like to ensure that we, students, staff and community all can openly work together to better our children's education within a solid, safe and productive environment. As she has gotten much more involved within the school district this past year including going to every board meeting this school year, she was able to see what programs are lacking space, staff and/or resources and would love to help make the appropriate, feasible adjustments needed. Being involved in the 4 organizations she has joined, has given her the privilege to work with teachers, administration, and other community members. It has opened her eyes even more to how much work and passion goes into our students. She has enjoyed being a part of each group and working with others with the same goal in mind which is to do the most we can for our students within the years they walk our halls.

CROGHAN FREE LIBRARY NEWS

The Croghan Free Library Board of Directors has elected to present a referendum for additional funding to the voters of the Beaver River Central School District on Tuesday, May 21.

The proposed additional \$5000 allotment is separate and apart from school budget funding, and would cost each taxpayer an average of \$2.00 more per year. Funds would be used to help offset the increasing cost of materials, technology, programming and salaries, and to help recoup monies lost from other sources. 88% of all North Country Library System member libraries receive money through school ballot referendums to assist them with library funding.

Since our last requested increase in 2022, all our numbers that we collect and report to the state have steadily grown. We have seen an increase of 18.2% of patrons requesting a library card, digital borrowing for eBooks and Audiobooks has seen a 60.4% jump, physical borrowing is up 38.5% and visits to our location are up almost 30%. We have a book club with 18 members, writing group with 10 members, story time with an average attendance of 22 children with a parent or caregiver and a tween group of Lego fans with an average attendance of 11. As you can see, the Croghan Free Library is alive and growing.

The library funding proposition will appear before the school district voters from 1-8 p.m. on May 21. Voters who are unable to be present for voting on that day may apply to the BRCS district office for an absentee ballot application by stopping in or calling 315-346-1211, ext. 500.

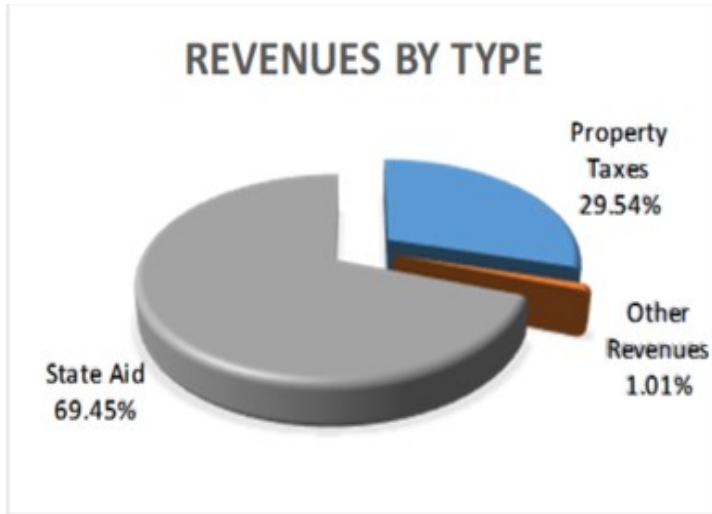

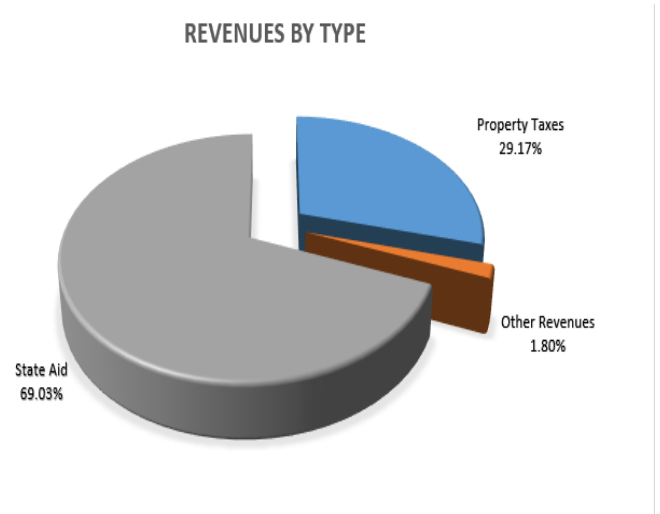

2023-2024 Revenues

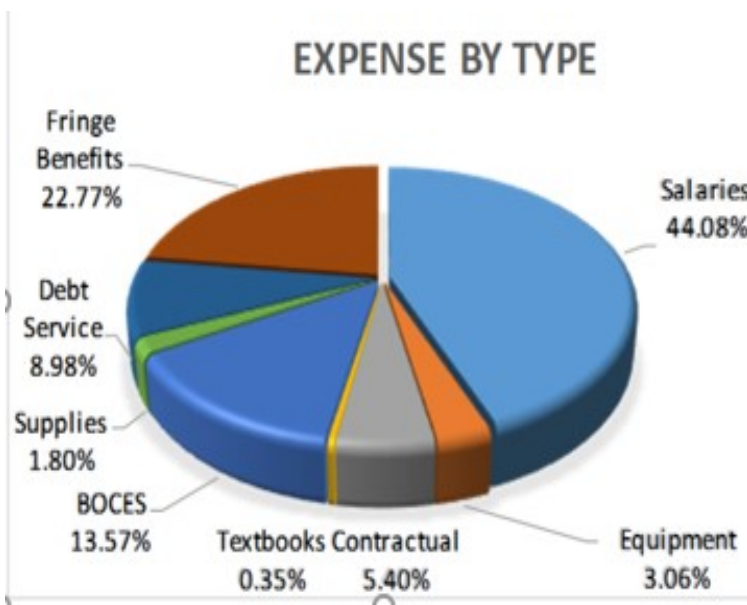


2024-2025 Revenues

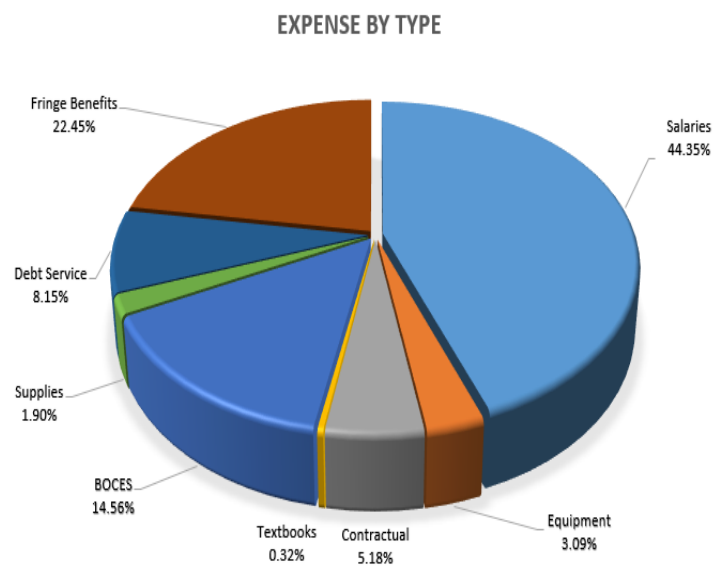


EXPENSES: Where the School district's money goes

First grade has been hopping with excitement this spring as we've been getting first-hand experience learning all about life cycles! In March, we learned how living things are classified into groups by scientists. We learned animal vocabulary words, such as *vertebrate*, *invertebrate*, *life cycle*, and *metamorphosis*. During the months of April and May, we are hosting earthworms in our classrooms, incubating chicken eggs, and observing amphibians developing from eggs to adults. It's an exciting time to be first grade scientists! Be sure to ask your child what they have learned and enjoyed while observing these living things.

THIRD GRADE NEWS

Greetings from Third Grade!

During the month of March we celebrated all things Olympics and Literacy with our elementary wide literacy celebration. This year's theme was centered around a love of reading and the upcoming summer Olympic games. As part of our kick off celebration the students participated in a walk of champions and got to listen to an interview with Olympic rock climber, Sam Watson. In his interview he talked about how important reading was to his success and parallels between reading and competing. The students learned that Watson knows five languages and challenges himself to read books in those languages! The third graders read a lot of books each week and became BRCS reading olympians!

Third grade spent some time learning all about the recent total solar eclipse. In Science class we discussed the meaning of totality, as well as the importance of wearing our eclipse glasses. The students were taught 4 different lessons on April 8th to help them learn about how the eclipse happens; how to keep their eyes safe, the history of an eclipse, the solar eclipse and nature, as well as making eclipse models.

In Math class, we are learning all about fractions! We have learned the definition of a fraction and a unit fraction, and have started writing fractions using models. We are almost through our multiplication program with x12 being the last fact to learn. The students have done well with their multiplication fluency and will be ready for fourth grade math!

Mrs. O'Brien's class was granted a classroom greenhouse through Cornell Cooperative Extension's "Farm to School" program. The gardening process has started with the planting of our Lettuce and Thyme seeds. We will continue to observe and monitor our greenhouse and we hope to have plants to take home to families by the end of the school year!

Drop-Off Policy

One Stop – One Alternate



In order to maintain the safety of our students being dropped off by a school bus, the BRCS D Transportation Department is instituting a clear policy on the number of drop-off locations for students. In the past, the School District has allowed multiple drop off locations depending on the day of the week, and other variables. However, we have found that with many locations for drop-off there is an increase in likelihood that a student may be dropped off at the wrong location. We understand that there may be childcare concerns for this year that have already been arranged by families. Therefore, there will be no change for the 2023-2024 school year.

However, beginning in the 2024-2025 school year the following transportation guidelines will be put in place:

Students will be allowed one primary drop-off location and one alternative (secondary) drop-off location. Both destinations will be kept on file in the transportation office.

It will be assumed that each child will be dropped off at their primary location unless a parent/guardian sends in a note for each day the student is to go to their alternative location.

Only notes given out by the transportation office will be accepted. Therefore, notes are to be written to the transportation office. (A school bus driver will not accept a hand-written note even if it is by the parent/guardian on file)

Understand that it is the parent's responsibility to have an adult present and visible at the drop-off site each afternoon for Grades PK-5. If no one is visible, the student will remain on the bus and return to school.

ECLIPSE FEST 2024

Eclipse Fest was a day like no other in BRCS history!

The total solar eclipse became an incredible learning experience. During the morning of April 8th, 2024, the entire BRCS school community participated in an "In School" field trip. Classes at all grade levels engaged in workshops specially tailored to their age group. One of these interactive sessions included an exploration of how the planets were aligned for the total solar eclipse using models. Students also considered how eclipses have been understood by people throughout history in a session. In another workshop they investigated safety issues, and used a simulation to explore how an eclipse could damage a human retina. The fourth workshop prompted students to predict how wildlife might respond to the eclipse and introduced them to citizen science projects that will add to the scientific knowledge base. The PE Teachers teamed up to lead Eclipse-themed pep rally challenges that added healthy and fun activity to the morning. "Wonder Time," provided us all with time to process this information and to loft more questions.

Students, their parents, and the entire community were welcomed back in the afternoon to witness the total solar eclipse. A variety of eclipse viewing options were available outside but the clear favorite were the giant solar eclipse glasses that the Gates family made for the event. Inside, the gyms were filled with everything from a Solar Eclipse Book Nook to an opportunity to participate in a Community Art Project, free face painting, hands on eclipse investigations, much appreciated food trucks, as well as coloring, and eclipse related games. One of Mrs. Gates' classes used canned food to model the scaled size of the Sun, Moon and Earth during a total solar eclipse. The sculpture they designed was entered into the Canstruction for Northern NY competition, and the non-perishable food that they collected has been donated to local food pantries.

Watching totality as a Beaver River community was profound and memorable. We're very grateful to everyone that attended. There's nothing like experiencing something that won't happen again for another 375 years with great friends and family!

A huge thank you is extended to Jamie Gates, BRCS' Earth Science teacher who took the lead on many parts of this initiative. Thanks is also extended to the student helpers, the PK-12 Science Department members, and the BRCS Leadership Team who were instrumental in its success.
